

## Emergency Rental Assistance Program is Keeping Families in Homes

Dauphin County's Emergency Rental and Utility Assistance Program has helped keep thousands of people and families in their homes.

The program also funds power bills for applicants impacted by the COVID-19 pandemic.

Dauphin County launched the program in March 2021 and has processed about 2,500 applications, releasing over \$16 million in funding to households in need.

"This program is more than just money," Commissioner George P. Hartwick, III said. "Our team also offers wrap-around services – like addiction treatment resources – to people and families in need."

The commissioners thank Dauphin County Library System for helping applicants file at libraries.

"This funding is literally keeping people in their home, with the lights on," Commissioner Chair Mike Pries said.

Commissioner Saylor credited county Human Services staff and community partners for keeping up with such a high-demand program.

## 17 Years, No Increase: How Your Tax Dollars are Spent

The commissioners approved the 2022 budget that – for a 17<sup>th</sup> consecutive year – does not include a property tax increase.

The general fund budget for 2022 is \$211.5 million.

But, what does it pay for?


The chart at right provides a breakdown of spending categories.

"We scrutinize the budget just like you do at home: line by line," Commissioner Chair Mike Pries said.

Commissioner Chad Saylor said: "We make budget decisions while looking ahead, so the county can be stable and strong for years to come."

Judicial (which includes court operations) and public safety (which includes prisons costs) make up more than half of the total budget expenditures.

"We also commit many resources to human services, including vital programs for our vulnerable residents and those dealing with substance use and mental health issues," Commissioner George P. Hartwick, III said.

# Commissioners Working to Fill Broadband Gaps

Online access is crucial today, so Dauphin County Commissioners are working to provide broadband Wi-Fi access to all residents

"The pandemic has emphasized our reliance on the internet, as many people are working from home," Commissioner Chair Mike Pries said.

Over recent months, the commissioners have been engaged with providers to determine costs – and available funding streams – for broadband improvements.

Most consumers do have access to Wi-Fi, but there are gaps, especially in rural areas, as well as some barriers in the city.

"Our hope is to connect the grid, so to speak, and enhance broadband north of the mountains," Commissioner Chad Saylor said. The commissioners have been prudent in gauging funding streams coming available, including those from federal and state streams, before designating local/taxpayer funds.

"We will not spend taxpayer dollars unless we absolutely have to," Commissioner George P. Hartwick, III said.
